Rapidly Receding Rector

‘Wow Tim, you have lost so much weight, I hardly recognised you!’ Rector (modestly) ‘Well, it is along time since I saw you in church’ ‘I need to lose weight badly too, I would do anything to lose a couple of stone.’ Rector ‘Why not come with me to Weight Watchers?’ ‘Oh I couldn’t possibly do that for the following excellent reason...’

So goes my conversation with many locals in Amersham and Coleshill. Being forty nine, and wanting to hit fifty in good shape, I have lost six stone since January 2003. But the ‘Fast’ has not been easy. As Jesus found when he went into the wilderness and fasted for forty days (from which Christians get the practice of Lent), the deprivation throws up all sorts of tough psychological and spiritual challenges.

The lack of food exposes my dependency on material things, my insignificance in the mass of humanity, my ultimate powerlessness in the face of death. It is as if all these demons come up and torment me in the desert of fasting. It has not been an easy year facing up to such things. Strong stuff! Yet read Matthew 4:1-11 and you will see that in the desert Jesus went through a far more testing version of the same process.

And yet, Matthew also writes of Jesus in the desert that ‘Angels came and attended him.’ In the last fourteen months I too have never known God to be closer, and have received all kinds of new spiritual gifts.

Maybe it is the desert experiences of life that the protecting ‘fat’ is stripped away and we see ourselves as we really are. But at the same time we are able to experience the closeness of God in a new and powerful way.

At Easter, as the Lenten fast ends, may you too experience the powerful inner joy of Jesus Christ risen from the dead.

This time the murder took place at Middle Twiddle on the (River) Fiddle. The show was held in the Village Hall on Friday 30th January and was accompanied by a delicious supper. The evening was enjoyed by a capacity audience, all tickets having been sold out three weeks before the event. Not only was Lindsey the author and director but she also had to appear on stage as one of the suspects had lost her voice. The evening was a great financial success making a profit of £2,069. Thanks to additional donations, including £500 from Church funds, the final amount sent to the Hospital was £3,052. The organising Committee have asked the Hospital to suggest a special project for which this amount could be used.

The Spring term started well with forty children on our roll. We were delighted to learn that we had been included in the Ofsted Chief Inspector's report for being a particularly successful school with an outstanding inspection report and excellent Statutory Assessment Test results (SATs). My thanks go to all the staff, governors and helpers who work so hard to make this such a special school.

The children have been working on a project, studying the work of the artist Philip Guston, whose unusual cartoon-like paintings are currently on display at the Royal Academy in London. We have had fun recreating our own version of his works, which can be viewed in our entrance hall.

Our new resource room looks resplendent with new books provided by generous donations and is in constant use. I cannot thank everyone enough who supported this project. The room is a great improvement to the learning environment of the school and has also had the added bonus of making the school feel much warmer, with cold outside walls now blocked in.

Two of our children have won prizes in the annual Rotary Club Christmas Story Competition. They are Jack Hogan and Emily Fallon, both Year 2 pupils. So our congratulations go to them and well tried everyone else who entered the competition.

We have just had a new interactive white board installed in the resource room, which will revolutionise the teaching at the school. We now have broadband internet at the school, to use with the interactive whiteboard, as well as some very exciting new interactive software. We try to keep up with information and technology provision, always mindful that we are preparing the children for an ever-changing world. At the same time we aim to retain a balance, not forgetting the importance of good old-fashioned traditions and values, which we hope will help children to grow up to be well-rounded, informed, thoughtful individuals.

This term the children enjoyed watching a puppet show presented by the Toy Box charity, as well as a music morning shared with Jordans school at which professional musicians performed for the children and encouraged them to join in with percussion instruments.

The Parents' and Friends' group at the school have, as always, been very supportive and have held several successful events including the Christmas Bazaar and the Quiz Night held in February. They are now busy organising the May Fayre, which takes place (weather permitting) in the school garden on Saturday, May 15th to which everyone is very warmly invited.

The school will be taking part in the Mothering Sunday service at All Saints on March 21st, and the End of Term service on Friday, April 2nd at 11.00 am.

This the Parish Council strongly disagrees with. Many residents attended the meeting to voice their opposition as well to the proposed introduction of the new speed limits. The Parish Council feel very let down by BCC that County hasn't taken on board the unanimous request it made for more consultation and greater lowering of the speed limit.
