MEMORIES OF COLESHILL

by A.E.Carter as told to Bill Houlton

I was born in 1925 at No.2 Manor Way and spent part of my first year there before moving with my family to one of the four tiny, back to back cottages which comprised Bottle Cottages – known today as Coleshill Cottage - one of several tied cottages in the village where estate workers lived. My father worked as a gardener for Mrs Wycliffis-Taylor who owned Bottle Cottages; the Deane family lived next door to us, adjacent to the road on the south side, whilst the Harris family lived next to the road on the north side and the Aldridge family lived in the remaining cottage. To the rear of Bottle Cottages, Mrs Wycliffis-Taylor built what was then known as Walnut Tree Cottage, in which she lived for the remainder of her life. My father also worked as a gardener for the Healey-Hutchinsons, relatives of Mrs Wycliffis-Taylor, who owned Coleshill House and what is now White Roses.

I have a very clear memory of my mother breaking the sad news to me, aged 5, that my father had died. The village was a very close and caring community and our neighbour, Mrs Aldridge, looked after me whilst my mother made the necessary arrangements; I played with Mrs Aldridge's two children, Joan who was my age and Frank who was about 18 months older. I recall that Frank owned a toy fire engine complete with lights and extending ladder – which was quite something in those days – and that this was produced to cheer me up.

I started school in 1930 when Mr Fred Stubbings was headmaster. He was a very accomplished gentleman who not only became an R.A. but was also the Church choirmaster, organist and a marksman; choir practice was every Wednesday evening and both the choir and congregation was quite large in those days. Mr Stubbings was replaced at the beginning of my second year by Mr Bill Young, who was to be the headmaster for many years.

Nature study lessons took place every two weeks when our teacher would take us for walks around the village and I remember these well. However, I was particularly interested in sport and every Friday at school was sports day; in summer we would play cricket and in winter, football. In those days football took place in a field down the lane running beside the Red Lion, on the left hand side. This ground was ploughed up during the war and afterwards we obtained a new field off Magpie Lane, known as Larkins Park, from Doug Pusey, which was our home ground until the team folded in 1965.

THE CHILTERN WAY

The Chiltern Way is a 125-mile circular route round The Chilterns, through some of the finest countryside in Bucks, Oxfordshire, Bedfordshire and Herts. The walk goes through the centre of Coleshill on the footpath running past the Red Lion and the Church. The Chiltern Way is the Millennium project of The Chiltern Society, utilising existing footpaths, now clearly marked with finger posts and waymarks. Walking the Chiltern Way is intended to be a memorable experience and you can join or leave the walk at any convenient point.

From Coleshill going south The Chiltern Way passes Winchmore Hill, Penn, Hambledon, Skirmet, Fingest, Turville and Stonor, reaching Benson at its most easterly point. The Way then heads north, via Stokenchurch, Bledlow, Little Hampden, The Lee and Ashridge reaching Whipsnade and Streatley at its most northerly point. Turning south again the route passes Bovingdon, Flaunden, Sarraft, and Chenies before returning to Coleshill.

A guidebook to The Chiltern Way is being written by Chiltern Society member and well known writer of walking books, Nick Moon. The guide will be published in time for the official opening of The Chiltern Way on Sunday 22nd October at the Coleshill Village Hall. Details will be available nearer the time.

The Chiltern Society was founded in 1965 in response to wide concerns about the damaging developments and impassable footpaths of the Chilterns. The Society is voluntary and is organised into key groups. Planning and Rights of Way Group - a network of local officers looking after all footpaths and development applications. Historic Works and Buildings Group - looking after conservation areas, listed buildings and restoration.

This group set up The Chiltern Open Air Museum, now an independent charity supported by The Chiltern Society. Chiltern Conservation Volunteers - organising work groups to improve paths and ponds, repair stiles and lay hedges. Rivers and Wetlands Conservation Group. The Society publishes a full colour quarterly magazine sent free to every member.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

We are pleased to report again that there have been no burglaries since the last newsletter. However, outlying properties, especially farmers, have again been targeted and continue to have tools and machinery stolen. Also a van, parked outside the owner's home at the top of New Road, was broken into and tools stolen. On one of our village farms, thieves tried to break into a Land Rover, triggered its alarm, alerted the farmer's wife who watched it travel down the road and into the gypsy site on the A355.

The police were called, sealed off the site and subsequently arrested the owners of a white van which was loaded with stolen tools. Two victims of recent crime in the village hope to reclaim lost tools from this hoard, although, at the time of writing, these are being used as evidence. Let us hope the perpetrators are dealt with severely as the poor old farmers have had a terrible thrashing from thieves in the last couple of years.

We can only repeat yet again, double check all your security and be very alert each time you travel through the village if you see anything untoward. Never think, "Oh, it's probably nothing"; you will kick yourselves if it turns out that it was. Many owners unfortunately allow their dogs to foul the paths on the Common, and on the Cricket Field and on verges where people walk. Whilst the Council did not wish to have special boxes put up, they did hope that dog owners would respect others and not allow their dogs to create a nuisance in this way.
